The Winter School: Heritage Conflict/Heritage of Conflict is addressed to PhD candidates at all of the Una Europa universities, Una-Her-Doc Programme and PhD candidates of the Doctoral School in the Humanities and the Doctoral School in the Social Sciences at Jagiellonian University. For admitted Una-Her-Doc PhD candidates, participation in the School is equivalent to participation in Una Europa workshops.

The Critical Heritage Studies Hub (CHSH) leads the Winter School in cooperation with the Doctoral School in the Humanities and the Doctoral School in the Social Sciences at Jagiellonian University and with Una Europa. The event will take place from 27.11.2023 to 01.12.2023 at the venue of the the Doctoral School in the Humanities and the Doctoral School in the Social Sciences at Jagiellonian University.

The Winter School is dedicated to the issues of heritage in conflict and heritage of conflict, considering four key aspects: heritage and types of conflicts, ways to preserve heritage before, during and after war conflicts, securing heritage and documenting it using digital tools, and challenges arising from the sustainable use and management of post–conflict sites for social, economic, and cultural purposes.

Therefore, the goal of the School is to provide the participants with the knowledge and competencies necessary to conduct research and analysis on types of conflicts in heritage, the legal aspects of heritage protection, the role heritage digitizing and conflict documenting institutions in heritage protection and safeguarding, as well as developing tourism infrastructure that promotes the site's cultural and historical value.

The activities during the five-day event will be organized in the form of lectures, panel discussions, workshops, and one-to-one seminars, as well as study visits during which the participants will gain essential competencies and skills necessary to conduct research on the issues of heritage in a situation of dynamic social, legal and technological changes taking place around the world. The classes will be conducted by recognized experts, practitioners and scholars with extensive experience and competence.

Day 2: Safeguarding heritage before - during - after war

28 November 2023: Room 1, the Doctoral School in the Humanities and the Doctoral School in the Social Sciences at Jagiellonian University, Main Square 34, 31-010 Cracow (2nd floor)

The day will focus on the question of how heritage can be protected in the event of armed conflict, how this protection takes place during the conflict, and what can happen after the end of armed conflict.

Leading themes and specific issues:

- international legislation defining the principles of protection,
- the current situation in Ukraine,
- revindication, lawsuits on the grounds of loss/destruction of cultural property.

Daily schedule:

1. Introductory lecture on how the international community has doctored the principles of protection of cultural property in the event of armed conflict.

Lecture: "Safeguarding Cultural Heritage in Armed Conflict: An International Law Perspective" + questions Keynote: Andrzej Jakubowski

2. Panel discussion: meeting of Ukrainian and Polish experts, how the rescue of cultural property was attempted, what succeeded, which actions turned out to become completely misguided, what threats are the most dangerous, whether and how to use the cultural property during the war in Ukraine; what damage is already the most painful.

Day 3: Post-conflict heritage for resilience and reconciliation

29 November 2023: Oskar Schindler's Enamel Factory, Lipowa Street 4, 30-702 Kraków (meeting point outside the building)

The aim of activities on Wednesday is to discuss challenges arising from the sustainable use and management of post–conflict sites for social, economic, and cultural purposes. Particular attention will be paid to developing tourism infrastructure that promotes the site's cultural and historical value while generating economic benefits. Particular emphasis will be put on recognizing and addressing potential conflicts and challenges in the presentation and interpretation of heritage so that heritage professionals can create more inclusive and respectful approaches to heritage that engage with diverse audiences and promote understanding and reconciliation.

Leading themes and specific issues:

- heritage of conflict in heritage studies discourse (sites of trauma, dissonant/difficult heritage),
- evaluation and valorization of heritage from memorialization to tourist attraction,
- the politics of memory/history,
- transnational heritage, hybrid, diaspora heritage the relationships between mobility and heritage of conflicts,
- dark tourism,
- resilience and reconciliation, community and citizen-based approach.

Day 4: Heritage in conflict / heritage of conflict & digital tools

On Thursday will be devoted to discussing digital tools for securing heritage in case of or during a conflict.

Leading themes and specific issues:

how digitization protects heritage and fails to do so,

- which forms of preservation are the most durable, whether digital preservation provides security guarantees,
- what are the latest formats for making heritage available online,
- whether digitally perpetuated heritage can be used in biased, bad-faith ways,
- how to document conflict,
- ethical issues in conflict documentation,
- methods in conflict documentation, including oral history,
- how digital tools make it possible to document conflict.

The assessment abstract of the project will be based on the following criteria:

- Subject in line with the theme of the fall school (mandatory requirement)
- Relevance of the selected topic to the development of research defined by the theme of the winter school (0–5)
- Novelty of hypotheses and/or research questions (0-5)
- The accuracy of the choice of methodology (0-5)
